Early Literacy Log

Ages 0-3

June 26 - August 21, 2024



Early Literacy is what children learn about reading and writing before they can actually read and write.

There are six Early Literacy skills your child can start learning from birth:

1. **Print motivation** - being interested in and enjoying books.
2. **Phonological awareness** - being able to hear the smaller sounds in words.
3. **Vocabulary** - knowing the names of things.
4. **Narrative skills** - being able to describe things and events and tell stories.
5. **Print awareness** - noticing print, knowing how to handle a book and knowing how to follow words on a page.
6. **Letter knowledge** - knowing letters are different from each other; knowing their names and sounds and recognizing letters everywhere.

Recite or sing a nursery rhyme and add some actions

Talk about the pictures in a book

Sing along to some songs together.

Describe the colors and shapes of your child's toys

Play with simple puzzles

Do a song and finger play such as "Itsy Bitsy Spider"

Let your baby play with different kinds of books: board books, touch & feel, lift the flaps

Play "I Spy" with your child

Let your child see YOU reading a book or magazine. Read a little out loud to your child

Spend some time reading with your child!

Have your toddler scribble or draw; help baby trace letters with their fingers

Make up a song to sing with your child about something you're doing today!

Teach your child new vocabulary by talking to them as you go about your day!

Talk with your child about how food tastes

Sing the alphabet song while flipping through an alphabet book

Read a rhyming book and emphasize the rhyming words

Play with textures using shaving cream, sand, rice, etc. for your child to explore

Talk with your child as you shop, pointing out objects and colors

Spend some time playing with your child!

Clap the syllables in your child's name, your name, names of family members

We encourage these activities and more like them all year long!
